IX. Treasurer's Report – Janine Bruhn

Overall financial status through April 2023 (as reflected in the PTSA budget hand out):

- PTSA total income: \$24,022
- PTSA total expenses: \$13,876
- ANG total income: \$19,762
- ANG expenses: \$8,085

Budget fitness as of April 2023:

Net membership income is just shy of the 2022-2023 budget goal of \$7,700 (income is \$7,195)

PTSA donations have exceeded the 2022-2023 budget goal of \$7,500 with \$11,025 total to date (surplus budget of \$3,525 for programming in order to limit the carry-over of funds).

Academic Booster donations have exceeded the 2022-2023 budget goal of \$2,000 with \$2,797 total to date (surplus budget of \$797 for programming in order to limit the carry-over of funds).

Madison Pantry and Outreach continues to receive significant donations – total to date is \$3,703 through March. With the \$5,530 in unspent donations from last year and \$3,000 expenses to date the pantry has <u>~\$6,233 to spend down for support activities</u> through June 2023/end of FY.

2022-2023 budget change:

The April revised budget reflects the \$500 increase to the Special Projects budget from \$2000 to \$2500.

Chris stated that all Board nominees are experienced PTSA volunteers, and as a group, the nominees have students in every grade at Madison. Every nominee present said a few words.

A Senior's Experience of Skills-Based Grading - Jennifer Hallworth, Claire Helvey

Jennifer Hallworth urged the Madison administration to

- · more closely examine the student-level impact of the proposed shift to skills-based grading, and
- survey the outgoing senior class to learn of their in-classroom experience of the current iteration of this grading system

Jennifer then introduced senior Claire Helvey, who wished to tell the group about her experience with the skills-based grading system.

Claire began by stating that 2022-23 is the first year in which the skills-based system governed grading in all her classes. She then detailed what she sees as the grading systems' chief effects on students:

- Students are less motivated to prepare for and participate in class because active student input (ihomework, quizzes, class participation) is no longer factored into students' class grades.
 - This is the case even in AP classes (she has taken 5 APs this year)
- Because the grading system does not require students to prepare for class regularly, over time in-class discussions have degraded badly, compromising students' learning, reducing their discussion skills, and generally creating an intellectually stale class environment.
- This lack of preparation over time has students' testing anxiety to extremes, as they now cram before exams to compensate for poor study habits
 - Ambitious students are discouraged and feel that they are not receiving proper credit for their work
 - Half-grades are no longer given as final grades, even though there is a qualitative difference between a Band B+ work
 - o Projects that students invested in are dropped from the grade book
- In summary:
 - Claire prefers the traditional method of grading that JMHS had in place her freshman year (2019-20. In her view, that system in which every grade counted both motivated students to keep up with their work and gave them regular and steady feedback about their progress.
 - Claire strongly urges Madison to poll all seniors about their experience with the new skills-based grading system and to take into account the seniors' feedback.
